
Seeing Yellow! The pursuit of the hardy, yellow, large-leaf rhododendron hybrid

The eastern United States are blessed with some wonderfully hardy and robust rhododendrons. We have the dozen or so native species of deciduous azaleastechnically Rhododendron- ranging in color from red, through orange, yellow, pink and white. We also have a few species of small-leaf rhododendrons - lepidotes, or scaly-leafed - in pinks and whites. And then we have two large-leaf rhododendron species, R. maximum, and R. catawbiense, both found in the eastern mountains and cold hardy. These large-leaf rhododendrons or elepidotes (scaleless) typically are either white or some shade from lavender to pink. They leave the gardener seeking a broader palette of color wanting or lusting after the less hardy Asian rhododendrons.

Asian rhododendrons fill the color spectrum with a rainbow bloom. Sadly, however, most of the species from Asia either lack hardiness to survive our winters or are otherwise too exacting in their cultural needs to be easily grown.

Beginning in the 1940s, David Leach pursued a dream of breeding a rhododendron hybrid possessing the hardiness, fine foliage, good form and



yellow blooms carried in a large, wellorganized, tight truss (Inflorescences of elepidote rhododendron are known as trusses). Leach saw as the culmination of his efforts, the excellent hybrid *R*. 'Capistrano,' but the pursuit of this plant yielded many other hybrids and followed many generations of breeding.

Leach's early efforts with yellow saw the introduction of pollen from the plant named after the famous plant explorer Frank Kingdon Ward: namely Rhododendron wardii. This rhododendron species varies in the wild from pale ivory to bright vellow and has the added benefit of being somewhat hardy. It's buds tolerate temperature lows of around zero degrees Fahrenheit, A cross with Rhododendron wardii using R. 'Catalgla', a white Catawba rhododendron as seed parent made in 1954 yielded a fine, glossy-leaved pale yellow hybrid Leach introduced in 1973 as R. 'Nile'. Another early hybrid of a white R. catawbiense and a selection of (R. wardii x R. fortunei) produced the plant R. 'Limelight.' While this hybrid was not introduced to the nursery trade, it was to play a part in later hybridizing efforts. Other crosses using the R. wardii hybrid R. 'Crest' produced the plants R. 'Peking,' and R. 'Hong Kong.'

Later generation crosses using the previously mentioned hybrids and similar unnamed selections produced the hybrids, *R.* 'Nikko,' *R.* 'Canary Islands,' *R.* 'Casanova,' *R.* 'Arabia,' and *R.* 'Capistrano.' Of the yellow flowered plants Leach generated, he was most proud of *R.* 'Capistrano.' While many of the mentioned hybrids prove difficult to cultivate away from the excellent soil in Madison, Ohio, *R.* 'Capistrano' grows well in many peoples' gardens around the country. 'Arabia' shows promise as a cultivar and has fine floral characteristics, opening pale yellow from pink buds and fading to ivory.

Leach's work to create a hardy, yellow-flowered, large-leaf rhododendron produced several fine garden plants and a number of lesser standing. *R.* 'Capistrano' continues to gain popularity as gardeners explore the range of colors available in this group of plants. It is the standard by which we judge other selections. Several of Leach's unnamed yellow rhododendron selections are being considered for introduction with great hope. Steve Krebs, director of the David G. Leach Research Station, is continuing to work toward better, more adaptable yellow rhododendrons using both the plants Leach produced and those from other breeding programs as well as exploring new germplasm sources for color. form and adaptability. From our perspective at the David G. Leach Research Station, the future is far from rosy, it is bright yellow!
