Following his death in 1952, he left an endowment, the largest source of financial support for the operations of the garden.

What can be said about the gardens? One could use any adjective: spectacular comes to mind. Manicured to perfection were: perennial, rose, Daylilies, and herb gardens, the list goes on. There are 30 full time staff members, along with 250 volunteers. 47 acres of land, and another 15 acres across the street. Sorry to say - Rhodies are no longer grown there.

We were treated to a tour of the mansion, along with the gardens. All the staff was knowledgeable, and shared with us little tidbits like: Mr. King was married twice, he had no children. He had just a small household staff. In his will, his two maids were allowed to stay in the mansion until their deaths.

Only touching on a few things in the gardens, two weddings were performed, the day we were there. There are greenhouses, duck pond, meeting hall, and so much more.

A big thank you to Tony and Annette Pizzino for hosting the meeting. It was a perfect day all the way around. As a bonus - sunny skies.

Steve Krebs was unable to attend, but sent suggestions about participating with Holden and becoming the

"experts" on specific rhododendron weekend Kotsons, along with Annette suggested GLC/ARS scholar-ship memberships for at least a year with two plant purchases. Also mentioned was making "how to" videos for YouTube, Power Points and linking websites effectively.

Eric would like to encourage Master Gardeners to see rhodos as a companion plants; there is also the social aspect of meeting which could be met by smaller, local meetings within the GLC/ARS.

Bert gave examples of success at Mission Oaks with symposiums on gardening and developing mini symposiums on rhododendron by dynamic and gifted speakers that teach, not preach. He also suggested a need to budget for IT and make a committee, not just a person. He encouraged the convenience of PayPal as a payment method. Lee Ann is 'jumping in' to rhododendrons at WW Nurseries with Dave as a mentor and gave updated websites.

Karen mentioned the chapter includes great public gardens (Holden/Cle. Botanical Garden, Mission Oaks as an example) as well as rhododendron experts like Steve Krebs at Leach Station, and also a grower/supplier of plants at WW Nursery. We have many hybridizers that have developed plants specifically for success in the Great Lakes areas. There are many fine private member gardens to enjoy. Great Lakes Chapter/ARS member Eric Oesterling, shares horticultural and Master Gardening updates...

Dieback on Rhododendrons

Eric Oesterling

The name is a mouthful but botryosphaeria is a very common fungus disease that causes dieback on rhododendrons and many other woody plants including dogwood, redbud, apple, beech, oak, pine and others. This disease takes advantage of plants that are weak due to stress caused by drought or other factors. Where I live in southwestern Pennsylvania last year we were complaining about all the rain from mid-June to mid-July. But then it was dry as a bone from mid-July to November. So I will be watching for signs of dieback.

Botryosphaeria is always around and gets into the plant through natural openings or wounds such as those caused by pruning, breakage or stress. Once beneath the bark the fungus kills cambial tissue - forming a dead area (canker) beneath the bark. If the canker encircles the stem then the branch dies from that point out. The cankered areas turn dark brown or black and if you look closely you can see tiny raised black pimples on the bark. Those pustules produce spores that spread the disease. Leaves on girdled branches wilt and die. Severity can vary from a branch or two dying back to large parts of the plant wilting and dying.

Fungicides are not effective against botryosphaeria. All you can do for diseased plants is to carefully prune out all affected branches. Pith and wood of infected branches will turn a dark brown color. Prune when branches are dry and sterilize pruning tools frequently to minimize spread by pruning. I use good tools that I plan to keep for the rest of my life so I rely on rubbing alcohol as my disinfectant. A mixture of 10% chlorine bleach and 90% water is often recommended and is an excellent disinfectant, but it is very corrosive to pruning tools.

Reduce stress (and therefore susceptibility) on plants by mulching, watering as needed and making sure they have the best possible conditions for growth. If plants are healthy and growing well they are very resistant to the disease but if they are stressed they become much more susceptible.



Rhododendron 'Mary Fleming' Rhody info: Share with friends who love and enjoy plants.

Historical Note:

Mary Fleming, hybridized by Guy Nearing (R. racemosum X R. keiskei) X R. Keiskei,) is a tidy, floriferous early blooming lepidote, With luminous, creamy-yellow bisque flowers, tipped in a soft salmon color, it is wonderfully hardy (-25), and is covered with 2" glossy, pointed green leaves, attractive all season (tinted wine in autumn). It is a moderate grower, achieving a 3'/4' upright growth habit in 10 years. Mary Fleming is a great early spring bloomer for the modern space- restricted garden. Mary Fleming blooms in our garden, and its bisque flowers compliment, nearby PJM plants. When introduced, it received The Award of Excellence, October 1978. Excuse the pun,—"An oldie, but a goodie." Guy Nearing, originator of the "Nearing Frame" an early, and very popular and successful rhododendron propagating system. Guy Nearing named this hybrid after the secretary of the ARS/New York Chapter.

David G. Leach & Kenneth Cox, Comment on G. Guy Nearing:

Lauded by Leach: for his "accomplishments in hybridizing, Nearing also a botanist, an artist, a chess master, a poet, an inventor and a folk dancer. He is the most remarkable man to appear on the horticultural scene in this generation."

Kenneth Cox: "Mary Fleming" Semi-dwarf-low EM, "This is one of the best hybrids of this type for Eastern US."


